How does a corporate membership work?

A corporation, company or organization is eligible for a coprorate membership. It is registered with Kiwanis International as a member of a local Kiwanis club.

A representative of the corporation's choosing is designated to exercise the rights and responsibilities of club membership on behalf of the corporation. He or she attends the local Kiwanis club's meetings, fundraisers and service projects, and is eligible to hold board or officer positions, and to act as the club delegate at conventions.

If the corporate member cannot attend a meeting or event, another representative of the corporation can attend in their place. This person will not, however, be considered an actual club member unless he or she joins.

If the corporate member takes another job, no problem. A new representative can be named as the corporate member to take his or her place without paying a new-member fee.

Annual dues can be paid by either the corporation or the representative. There is no change required to club bylaws for a corporate membership.

How does the club start a corporate membership?

It's easy. On the membership application form, the club simply needs to note that the membership is a corporate membership. If the designated corporate representative changes, Kiwanis International only asks that the club report the name change. There is no fee for this change.
